Molly Rauzi brings digital technology, business transformation and large-scale change management experience from the public and private sectors. She has extensive expertise and experience with information technology and cybersecurity including governance, oversight, risk management and operations addressing both physical (such as buildings and campuses) and cybersecurity.

She currently serves as a director of Craig Hospital where she serves on the audit and finance committee. Ms. Rauzi is a current director and former chair of the Colorado Technology Association, where she chaired the nominating committee for three years and served on the executive committee for nine years. She is an advisory council member for NewCloud Networks where she advises the President and owner on matters related to cloud computing and cyber security. Ms. Rauzi has served on the Center for Information Technology Innovation at the University of Colorado Denver Business School for twelve years.

Ms. Rauzi is currently Managing Director and Chief Information Officer for Gagen MacDonald, a strategy execution firm supporting Global Fortune 500 companies going through significant change. Prior to joining Gagen MacDonald, she was the Managing Director for Grant Thornton's Business Advisory Services in Denver, Colorado, where she consulted with clients on technology strategy, merger integration, cyber security and business strategy. She joined Grant Thornton when John Hickenlooper became the Governor of Colorado. Ms. Rauzi was the Chief Information Officer for the City and County of Denver under then Mayor John Hickenlooper. In this role, she led the shared services initiative where 58 government agencies consolidated their technology services under a newly formed centralized agency, Technology Services. This included all technology for the Police, Fire, Sheriff, Human Services, Finance, Parks and Recreation, Department of Revenue, 911 emergency response services, et cetera. She was responsible for the technology and cyber security involved in being the host city for the 2008 Democratic National Convention, a designated National Special Security Event (NSSE) and led by the National Secret Service. Ms. Rauzi was later hired to consult on cybersecurity with Charlotte North Carolina to prepare for the 2012 DNC through Grant Thornton. As Director of Technology for the Denver International Airport, Ms. Rauzi was responsible for the technology and cyber security for the airport, and as such, served as the Program Manager for Y2K and led the technology and cyber security improvements following 911.

She holds a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration from Regis University and a Master of Science degree in Systems Management from the University of Denver.

She has been awarded Outstanding Woman in Business for Finance and Accounting (2016), Top 25 Most Powerful Women in Colorado (2017), and PR Week Woman to Watch (2019).
